American Sign Language (ASL) is one of the five most commonly used languages in the United States. American Sign Language is a vital language and is used for communication with and amongst Deaf people, nonverbal individuals and individuals with speech impediments.

Career Opportunities

Northeast Ohio is home to a relatively large Deaf population and boasts several organizations that create a regular demand for skilled individuals who are familiar with Deaf culture and American Sign Language. In particular, there is a shortage of trained educational interpreters in Northeast Ohio. Many of our graduates transfer to local interpreting programs and are expected to fill this growing need.

Lakeland's Program

Lakeland's American Sign Language studies program offers a two-year course of study leading to an Associate of Applied Science degree in applied American Sign Language. Lakeland's program offers a foundation in American Sign Language studies and acquaints students with basic issues of concern to the Deaf community. The program offers an opportunity for individuals who plan to work in the Deaf community to increase their understanding of American Sign Language and Deaf culture in order to strengthen their knowledge and their communication skills.

The Lakeland Advantage

- American Sign Language classes average less than 15 students fostering interaction with peers and faculty.
- Lakeland's faculty are well respected members of the Deaf community, including native speakers and licensed interpreters.
- Opportunities for refining language skills are offered through engaging student-centered classes and integrated extracurricular activities.
- Students receive opportunities to partner with local Deaf organizations and community members.

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Applied American Sign Language Studies (9312)


Associate of Applied Science Degree

This program is designed to give students a foundation in American Sign Language (ASL) and to acquaint them with basic issues of concern to the Deaf community. Furthermore, the program offers an opportunity to individuals already working in the Deaf community to increase their understanding of ASL and Deaf culture in order to strengthen their knowledge and their communication skills. This program will give students sufficient training to:

1. allow for effective communication with Deaf persons in informal settings in teaching, human services, or healthcare;
2. enhance their credentials for employment opportunities which do not require interpreter certification but do assign value to skills in ASL and knowledge of Deaf culture;
3. earn the academic qualifications for entry into advanced studies at universities offering sign language programs;
4. enter an interpreter training program, after which they may sit for a certification examination, sponsored by the national licensing organization.
