Electronic Books Now in the Lakeland Library Catalog

OhioLINK has acquired a growing collection of e-books available through its Electronic Book Center at: <http://ebooks.ohiolink.edu/xtf-ebc/>.

You can search the OhioLINK Electronic Book Center by **selected subjects**, by keyword search, through “browse” or click on an e-book collection icon at the bottom of the page. The books may be read online or as an Adobe Acrobat file (PDF).

Currently, the Electronic Book Center includes the following collections: American & English Literature, Safari Computer Technology, Humanities, Oxford Reference & NetLibrary.

Publishers include:

ABC-CLIO: educational reference books, primarily in the humanities and social sciences.

Gale: reference books published by Thomson Gale; also some reference books from Macmillan, Saur, and Scribner.

Oxford University Press: scholarly books, both classic and new works, in the humanities and social sciences.

Oxford imprints include OUP Oxford, OUP USA, and Clarendon Press.

Sage: encyclopedias and reference books mainly in the social sciences.

Springer: scientific, technological and medical books. Springer imprints also include Apress, Birkhäuser, Physica-Verlag, Steinkopff, and others.

Links to these e-books are added to the Lakeland Library catalog as they become available. Electronic books in the Library catalog are distinguished by the link '[Electronic Resource](#)' and identified by e-book icons such as one of following:



Electronic Reserves — ERes

With fall semester underway, it is time to consider how electronic reserves (ERes) could be helpful to you and your students. Your syllabus, class notes, sample tests, assignments and the supplemental reading material required for your course can be placed on electronic reserve. Electronic reserves will save you **time** distributing items in class, **time** taking items to the copy center and **printing costs** to Lakeland.

Electronic reserves provide students with 24/7 electronic access to these materials and makes it easy for them to replace any materials they may have lost. Items to be placed on electronic reserve can be brought to the library in **paper form, on a CD or floppy**, or materials can be sent as an **e-mail attachment** to: reserves@lakelandcc.edu.

Digital Media Center

OhioLINK's Digital Media Center, found at: <http://dmc.ohiolink.edu/> provides access to a variety of electronic resources including:

- Digitized educational films—can be downloaded to a PC or 'streamed' for classroom viewing
- Images of art works
- Photographs of volcanoes
- Medical images including reproductive physiology animations
- Historical images, such as maps
- Foreign language videos and much more!



Consider including these web-based resources into online courses or show them in a traditional class.

Information Literacy in Your Class

Lakeland Librarians have created assignment templates that address aspects of the College's Information Literacy Learning Outcome. Faculty can use these templates independently or incorporate them into existing assignments. They are available on the library's website at <http://library.lakelandcc.edu/ILgateway.html>.

These assignment templates provide a written summary of the objectives of the assignment, preparation needed, as well as summary and review points.

Last academic year, Lakeland Librarians taught **301** Information Literacy sessions. Through these sessions, we reached **4768** students.

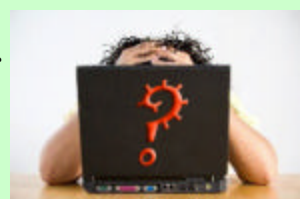

Pick-Up @ Any Library

Need to borrow OhioLINK materials, but can't get to Lakeland Library? "Pick-up @ Any Library" is now available. Faculty and students, including distance learners, now have the option of picking up requested materials at any conveniently located, participating OhioLINK library.

Here's how:

- Request an item from the **OhioLINK Library Catalog**
- Select your institution. Enter your name and Lakeland ID#.
- Select a **Pickup Institution** from the list.
- Select a **Pickup Location** at the Pickup Institution.

When Lakeland CC is selected as the **Pickup Institution**, library users can choose to have their materials sent to the following **Pickup Locations**:

Lakeland Main Campus	Lakeland East
Lakeland Main Curbside	Lakeland West

Material Needed Not in OhioLINK ? Interlibrary Loan It!

There are other ways to obtain books and articles that might not be available in OhioLINK. Consult a Reference Librarian and they will explain how. If the material that you need isn't available, articles and books can be ordered for you from anywhere in the world. An Interlibrary Loan Request Form can be filled out with a Reference Librarian. Most items are loaned at no charge, but occasionally, a lending library will charge a fee for lending books or copying articles. Lakeland library users have received books from as far away as Sweden and Italy, and from all over the United States.

NEW Database! Opposing Viewpoints

The *Opposing Viewpoints Resource Center* database is an enhanced online version of the print series available in Lakeland Library. Users may select a topic from the list or keyword search all the articles within the database. Users may also limit by type of source, find primary sources, or look for news sources.

Links to *Opposing Viewpoints Resource Center* are on the Lakeland Library website under the **Search & Find** menus for **Books, Etc.** or **Articles, Etc.** or **All E-Resources.**

There is also a link under the **Guides & Help** menu for **Picking a Topic.**
